From 1 July 1837 births, marriages and deaths in England and Wales and births and deaths at sea have been registered by the officials of the Registrar General. Information for these records can be found on:

In Yorkshire the indexes from 1837-1980 can be seen in York City Library, Museum Street, York, YO1 7DS. They can also be seen at Northallerton Library, 1 Thirsk Road, Northallerton, DL6 1PT and at Leeds Central Reference Library, Municipal Buildings, Leeds, LS1 3AB.

If you have a correct index references you can apply for a copy of a certificate on–line, see www.col.statistics.gov.uk for more details.

If you do not have an index reference you can still apply for copies to The General Register Office, PO Box 2, Southport, Merseyside, PR8 2JD (or phone 0870 243 7788). They will need a full name, the date of the event (as exact as possible), and the place where it took place.
