

IMPORTANT NEW TITLE MAKING HISTORIES

PROCEEDINGS OF THE SIXTH INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON INSULAR ART, YORK 2011, EDITED BY JANE HAWKES

Insular Art is the art peculiar to the islands of Britain and Ireland which was produced in the early medieval period (up to the eleventh century, and the twelfth in some regions). It includes work in all the arts: architecture, sculpture, decorated metalwork and manuscripts, and is well known through such famous objects as the Book of Kells, complex pieces of jewelry, liturgical vessels and weaponry, and impressive early churches such as that at Escomb in Co. Durham. Since 1985 Insular Art has been the subject of a series of international conferences, each held in different locations in

the islands. The sixth conference took place at York in 2011. This collection of 32 essays by leading art and cultural historians is 512-pages long and has 220 resplendent black and white illustrations and a further 59 pages in glorious colour.
