At an event in Cambridge last week, I and some colleagues presented some of the results of our <u>YCEDE project</u>, which is looking to increase the ethnic diversity of the UK PGR community. 30 Apr: Fee payment reminder

A quick reminder that if you pay your own fees, a payment instalment is due at the end of this month. We've set ourselves an ambitious target: saving over 1,500 tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent in just 12 months. Responsible investment at the University

We have announced that <u>the University no longer holds investments in companies that primarily make or sell weapons</u> and defence-related products or services. The changes to our responsible investment statement also confirm that York does not and will not invest in companies whose primary activity is tobacco, gambling, adult entertainment or predatory lending.
