Kester Aspden was born in Toronto in 1968 and raised in York. After degrees at Lancaster and York he awarded his PhD in history from the University of Cambridge. He taught the history of crime, policing and punishment at the University of Leeds before he began his freelance writing career. His first book, *Nationality: Wog. The Hounding of David Oluwale* was published by Jonathan Cape in 2007 and won the Crime Writers' Association Gold Dagger for non-fiction in 2008. In 2009 the book was adapted for the stage, playing at West Yorkshire Playhouse, Birmingham Rep, Hackney Empire and a number of important provincial venues. He has just completed a new book entitled *Broken English: Memoir of a Troubled Youth*, which deals with his youthful involvement with the criminal justice system and its consequences. It is to be published by Simon and Schuster in the spring of 2012.
