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

Why did we take a participatory approach?

- Lived experience confers its own forms of knowledge and expertise
- People living on low incomes are typically excluded from debate about social security
- Participatory approaches can facilitate alternative narratives and new ideas
- The context unprecedented. Made sense to work things out collaboratively.

What did we do?


- Underpinned by feminist ethics of care and reciprocity

- Big Ideas Group online participatory discussion groups
- Arts based activities zine making, writing, audio clips
- Dissemination and media media training, peer support
