## **US Policy Origin**

- Historical Framework and Early Policy Objectives
  - Public Welfare Policy
    - Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC)
    - Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)
  - Child Support Policy
    - Office of Child Support Enforcement (OCSE)



#### U.S. Child Support Laws & Regulations

- Federal Child Support Guideline Requirements (1988)
  - Set of rules and tables used to determine child support
- State Plans
  - Makes provisions for individual states and territories to enact flexibility variations in eligibility rules
- State Flexibility
  - Allows state to state and other territories to calculate the amount of child support that non-custodial parents should pay based on their net income each month.



#### Federal Performance Measures

- Five Performance Measures
  - Paternity Establishment
  - Child Support Order Establishment
  - Collection of Current Support
  - Collection of Arrears
  - Cost–Effectiveness
- Federal Incentive and Penalty System
  - Requirements for Receiving Federal Incentives
  - Avoiding Federal Penalties



#### Implementation of Pass Through Laws

#### Pass Through

 Define as an assigned support collection (applied to either current support or arrearages) that the State elects to pay to the family rather than retain to reimburse assistance.

#### Disregard

- Defined as the amount of a pass through payment to a family that is disregarded by the welfare agency for the purpose of determining eligibility and the amount of assistance from the State that is provided to the family.
- Original intent was to encourage cooperation with child support enforcement.



#### Implementation of Pass Through Laws

- Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act of 1996
  - A Welfare Reform Plan
  - Allowed states the option to eliminate or setting their own pass through and disregard policy
  - 45 changes implemented that were included in the Child Support Bill
    - Computerized State-wide Collections
    - National New Hire Reporting System
  - Rewarded states for transitioning welfare recipients into jobs
- Deficit Reduction Act of 2005
  - Incentive to States to collect child support without reducing TANF benefits
- 2014 Notice of Proposed Rulemaking
  - Notice of Proposed Rulemaking: Flexibility, Efficiency, and Modernization in child support programs.




#### Pass Through/ Disregard Examples

- How Pass Through is Paid to TANF Families
  - State of California
    - Up to \$50.00 Passed Through and Disregarded
      - Support Obligation \$500.00
         Support Payment Made \$500.00
         Disregard Payment to TANF Families \$50.00
  - District of Columbia
    - Up to \$150.00 Pass Through and Disregarded
      - Support Obligation \$500.00
         Support Payment Made \$500.00
         Disregard Payment to TANF Families\$150.00

## Comparative Research

- Wisconsin Case Study
  - In 1997, Wisconsin was granted a Federal waiver to implement a policy enabling TANF families to receive the full (100%) pass through.
  - Wisconsin case study revealed a statistically significant positive effect on child support.
  - Analysis
    - Increased the amount of child support received
    - Higher rates of paternity establishment
    - Improvements in social outcome
    - 75% Pass Through as of 2013



## Comparative Research


- Washington DC Case Study
  - In 2005, The District of Columbia enacted a \$150/month pass through and disregard policy, which went into effect April 2006.
  - During first the year \$1.2 million passed through.
  - In FY 2008, 2,151 custodial parents on TANF received a pass through payment.



#### State Child Support Pass Through Policies

21 States and the District of Columbia <u>have</u> a Pass Through Policy
 29 States <u>do not</u> have a Pass Through Policy


#### States Not Currently Passing Through
