2015-16 Event programme launched with safeguarding theme

Our new programme launched on Tuesday 22nd September at the Priory Street Centre in York. "Safeguarding children and young people; messages from research, implications for practice"

brought together a number of eminent speakers in this field.

- Professor Nick Frost of Leeds Beckett University shared his thoughts and experiences on learning from serious case reviews. Nick argued for a shift from a failure discourse to a complexity discourse
- Professor Nina Biehal presented her latest research on the abuse and neglect of children and young people in care, particularly those in residential and foster care
- Professor Juliet Koprowska presented some very recent research on communicating with parents in the context of child protection. Her work on discourse analysis really made us think about what we say and how we say it!

Adult social care; messages from research, implications for practice - Tues 6th October, Hull

We present a range of research topics across the spectrum of adult social care, including:

- A decade of serious case reviews; the evidence and implications for practice (Stephen Clay, Hull Safeguarding Adults Board_
- Survivorship; living with cancer and long-term conditions (Sue Taplin, University Campus, Suffolk)
- Specialist and generic reablement services in England: results from a national survey (Fiona Aspinal & Gillian Parker, University of York)
- Understanding everyday help and support (Ilona Haslewood, Joseph Rowntree Foundation)

Advocacy in social work; a research and practice event - Thurs 3rd December, Wakefield

This event will look at advocacy in social work with children and young people, and with adults. It considers the differences and similarities in advocacy with children and young people and adults and offers workshop options suitable for those working with children or adults.

Optional workshop topics will include:

- Independent mental health advocacy (Julie Ridley, University of Central Lancashire)
- Advocacy for looked after children and children in need (Christine Oliver, Thomas Coram Research Unit, University College London)
- Advocacy across the older generations (Dorothy Hodgkinson, Older Citizens Advocacy York)
- Outcomes and impact of advocacy for children and young people in a range of settings (University of Central Lancashire and The Office of the Childrens Comissioner for England)

Developing an approach to engaging fathers within children's social care - Thurs 25th February, York



This half-day event will be presented by Gavin Swann, Head of Service, Safeguarding and Quality Assurance, London Borough of Croydon. Gavin qualified as a social worker in 1998 and has practiced mostly in London, but spent 4 years working for UNICEF and other NGOs in Eastern Europe, the Caucuses and Central Asia. Gavin first became interested in working with fathers when he recognised that he held prejudicial views of men as valueless, as violent, and as absent. Academic study has allowed him to unpick these stereotypes and develop a methodology to support social workers, managers and statutory organisations to involve fathers in social worker assessments and interventions.





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Evaluation of 2014-15 programme

International Centre for Mental Health Social Research wins work closer to home

The ICMHSR is part of a new collaboration between academics and North Yorkshire Police, working together to improve policing by developing new approaches to dealing with policing and mental health problems

Dr Martin Webber, the Director of the International Centre for Mental Health Social Research is partner in new £1 million collaboration between the University of York and North Yorkshire Police which is being led by Professor Martin Smith. Part of the £10 million Police Knowledge Fund launched to encourage collaboration between academia and police forces, York is one of 14 successful UK bids. Each collaboration aims to increase evidence-based knowledge, skills and problem solving approaches within policing.

The project Co-Production of Policing Evidence, Research and Training: Focus Mental Health will



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develop mechanisms to change the practice and culture surrounding recording and working with people with mental health problems, both criminals and victims.

Project activities will include: a series of 'Research Cafés' for managers and service providers to discuss their experiences in managing mental health problems and what they see as challenges, opportunities and potential solutions; a systematic review of literature on policing and mental health; evaluations of mental health triage, recording of mental health data and self-harm; and working with partner institutions to develop joined-up mechanisms for dealing with mental health problems.

Following this, the project will launch national level workshops to ensure best practice is shared across the UK, and the University of York will provide intensive training for police and health practitioners, including the development of a tailored part-time Master's programme. The Centre for Social Work Practice (<u>www.cfswp.org</u>) is a small national charity working with host organisations, which are usually universities, across England, parts of Wales and shortly also Scotland. They are focused on the promotion of relationship based practice and provide a voice for the profession in this area of practice and have a strong educational and developmental focus.



Their main activities have been conferences and seminars and more recently they are working to deliver a range of services to practitioners and their employers such as developing provision and research into reflective practice groups. The events they offer are relevant for a wide range of professionals and practitioners, where relationship based practice is necessary to provide the best possible experience for those seeking or requiring help. They believe that relationship based practice is an essential component for social work practice, ensuring that there is reflection and learning within the role.

- a conference in early 2016 where Dr. Sharon Shoesmith, Professor Andrew Cooper and Dr Jadwiga Leigh will present their work with a child protection focus
- a discussion group at the end of 2015 in Scotland (Dundee or Edinburgh) where Dr Jane Herd will talk about the Centre to help plan future partnership working and events
