Successful Ofsted inspection for the Department of Educational Studies PGCE programme

You will know by now that our PGCE course has achieved the top grade – Grade 1: Outstanding – following our Ofsted inspection in March. Congratulations to all the team for their efforts ensuring that the University of York retain the highest standard of achievement for this programme and the experience of its trainees.

The partnership comprises over 50 secondary schools and there are 132 trainees on the course. The Inspectors focused on the overall effectiveness of the training in supporting high quality outcomes for trainees and the capacity of the partnership to bring about further improvements.

The key strengths were identified as: the trainees' outstanding professional skills; the highly coherent training programme, built on excellent communication across the partnership; the outstanding commitment of all involved in the partnership; the excellent use of

resources which responds sharply to trainees' needs and the provider's outstanding capacity to improve, as evidenced through maintaining high quality outcomes for trainees. Student Education Society


Vork University Education Society

Dr Damon Cartledge visited the Department of Educational Studies since mid-March hosted by Professor Frank Hardman. Usually based at the Faculty of Education at La Trobe University in Melbourne, Australia, Dr Cartledge is currently conducting research into the role of universities in improving the scope and practice of technical education. His work whilst based at York, has been in comparing approaches of Australian, UK and Malaysian contexts. The project is founded on UNESCO recommendations on the provision of Technical and Vocational Education in the 21st century. Being based at the University of York has provided excellent access to a wide range of universities and academics in the North-East and Scotland for Damon to conduct his research. Damon leaves York in mid-April to take up an appointment as Visiting Professor at the University of Technology Malaysia, where he will continue his research before returning to Australia to complete the project.

Research News

Analysing the work of the National STEM Centre

Judith Bennett, Ian Abrahams, Martin Braund and Fred Lubben, together with Vanya Gallimore in the University Library, will be undertaking a £170,000 research study to assess the impact of the National STEM Centre. The £5m National STEM Centre is funded by the Gatsby Charitable Foundation and the Department for Children Schools and Families. It opened

earlier this year and houses a collection of curriculum resources, including on-line resources, to help school teachers and lecturers engage young people in those subjects. It aims to raise the profile of science, technology, engineering and maths in schools.

The National STEM Centre represents a significant investment in school education so it is important that its performance is closely monitored to assess its impact in classrooms. Over the next three years, the project will track how educators learn about the Centre, access its resources and use those materials to improve their lessons.

Teaching and Learning Grant Success

Language and Literature in Education lecturers have been successful in securing a £8,000 grant from the White Rose Centre for Excellence in Teaching and Learning in Enterprise to develop pupil support packs for 'A' level students studying Shakespeare. The innovative project lead by Amanda Naylor and Nick McGuinn will involve second year BA Language and *Literature in Education* (BALLE) students in the department. The students will work cooperatively in teams and liaise with staff and students in local schools and colleges to develop useful materials to support AS Level English Literature students with their 'A' Level Shakespeare coursework. Students taking the Teaching Shakespeare module this autumn will research, write, and produce the materials.
