Educational aims of the programme(s)

For the Masters:

The academic content of the programme concentrates on the critical comprehension, understanding, and analysis of developments in international political economy, in terms of its theories, issues and conflicts. Students will be equipped with critical analytical insights into contemporary issues such as globalisation, trans-nationalisation, development, conflict and human rights. Competency will be developed in the critical theories of and contemporary approaches to international political economy. On completing the programme we want students to know and understand the historical evolution of different approaches to international political economy, and we want them to be able to apply these approaches to contemporary issues in international political economy. Students will apply the intellectual skills developed in the programme in the preparation and presentation of theoretical and/or applied analyses in the form of a dissertation.

For the Diploma and Certificate:

The academic content of the programme concentrates on the critical comprehension, understanding, and analysis of developments in international political economy, in terms of its theories, issues and conflicts. Students will be equipped with critical analytical insights into contemporary issues such as globalisation, trans-nationalisation, development, conflict and human rights. Competency will be developed in the critical theories of and contemporary approaches to international political economy. On completing the programme we want students to know and understand the historical evolution of different approaches to international political economy, and we want them to be able to apply these approaches to contemporary issues in international political economy.

The award and assessment regulations apply to all programmes: any exceptions that relate to this programme are approved by University Teaching Committee and are recorded at the end of this document.
