The programme of study has a strong comparative and international focus and will be of particular interest to public sector professionals and NGOs managers within East Asian policy environments. The programme draws across University of York expertise and networks including:

- core academic staff within the Department of Social Policy & Social Work
- specialist research units (Centre for Housing Policy and Social Policy Research Unit)
- relationships with local, national and international bodies including analysts based within local and national government and NGOs, and bodies such as the OECD, UN and WHO.

The programme will consist of modules focusing on Comparative Social Policy, Policy Analysis and Public Management.

In addition to the above, for the diploma students need to complete a short independent study module (Applied Policy Transfer Project).

Additionally for the MPA:

Students completing at MPA level will also complete two short modules on practice-based professional learning, an Independent Study Module (Scoping Review Report) and a suite of research methods training modules.
