#### Educational aims of the programme

The Centre for Lifelong Learning sees its role as being to provide exciting and pioneering adult education opportunities to citizens in the local community (City of York and North Yorkshire). The accredited programme of study therefore is distinctive in its equality of opportunity, offering an enriching educational experience in a supportive environment that is tailored to and responsive to the needs of adult learners.

- Encourage students to think critically and independently.
- Encourage and support an enthusiasm for the subject area.
- Provide knowledge and understanding of the concept of an inter-disciplinary certificate.
- Provide stimulating and relevant modules relating to the aspirations and needs of adult learners, which will equip students with confidence and the ability to enhance their personal development.
- Equip students with a variety of generic study skills appropriate to this level of study.

York, like many other UK cities, has in recent years seen a burgeoning interest in local food, community gardening, therapeutic or educational uses of horticulture, and sustainability. The Centre for Lifelong Learning recognises that it is timely to offer an accredited, applied, interdisciplinary course with a strong basis both in natural and social science, and with myriad learning and volunteering opportunities for students available locally. Its aims are:

- To explore the many roots and branches of the urban horticulture 'movement' its evolution, scientific basis and diverse theoretical and philosophical standpoints
- To introduce students to the work of representative organisations of this movement on a variety of scales, from local to global
- To develop skills of data analysis, strategic thinking, critical and independent thinking, research, debate, presentation of ideas, practical horticulture and team working
- To assess the potential of urban horticulture to substantially alter the food system, both locally and globally
- To build students' confidence as actors within the urban horticulture movement.

It is anticipated that the course will be of particular interest to allotment holders and gardeners, as well as volunteers and staff of the many horticultural projects active in York keen to broaden and deepen their professional knowledge.
