The systems you will use and typical activities

Here is a quick summary of the information systems used at York and some of the activities you will be asked to use these systems for.

Your IT account

Directions on how to set up your IT account (including your username and password) will be sent as part of your joining instructions to the personal email account you have provided us. This will happen as soon as your place is confirmed. **Please keep your password safe and do not share it.**

You will need to set up your account at <https://idm.york.ac.uk/> to log in to the University's IT facilities, complete pre-arrival tasks and gain access to the learning and research systems.

e:vision

e:vision is your view of your student record – the personal information you have given to the University.

You can log in to e:vision using your IT username and password to access and update your details on the system. It is important the details you have provided are correct, and that you keep them up-to-date throughout your studies.

Tasks to complete on e:vision before term starts or your research place begins:

- 1 Enrol as soon as possible.
- 2 Upload a photograph for your University card (see page 17).
- 3 If you are an international student requiring a visa to study in the UK, please take a copy of the photo page (or details page) in your passport and your visa and upload to e:vision. The University is legally required to keep a record of these.
- 4 Make any Direct Debit payments to the University (for example if you are paying fees or are paying for University accommodation).
- 5 Choose and join a college (if you have booked University accommodation you may have done so already).

University email

When you have set up your IT account, you will be given an email address with the format username@york.ac.uk.

Please note: From now on, all email contact from the University will be sent directly to your University email address. This will include emails from Admissions, Registry and other central services as well as from your academic department and college.

Virtual Learning Environment (VLE)

York has a Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) called Yorkshare. Mathematics and SPSW distance learning students also use a VLE system called Moodle.

The VLE is used by most departments to communicate with students and will often host study materials and support for academic work. This environment is also used to complete compulsory and voluntary skills tutorials.

Use the VLE to:

- 1 Access any teaching and learning materials supplied on the VLE by your department.
- 2 View any postgraduate-focused Academic Skills tutorials.
- 3 Make use of Turnitin to check the references for your academic submissions.

Visa requirements

If you are from outside the European Economic Area (EEA) or Switzerland, you will need a Tier 4 (General) visa to study in the UK.

Top five things to do or know...

- 1** Please do not arrive in the UK without obtaining a relevant visa first.

Please also note students from certain countries are required to register with the Police within seven days of arriving in the UK. To find out if you need to register, see www.york.ac.uk/arriving/student-visa

- 2** If studying at the University for **fewer than six months** you can get a Student Visitor visa (instead of a Tier 4 visa). However, be aware of the restrictions on this visa, and make sure you get it before you travel. Certain nationalities are able to apply for a Student Visitor visa on arrival in the UK, **but** this is not recommended because of the risk of being refused and sent back to your home country.

- 3** Check if it is a condition of your visa to undergo tuberculosis (TB) screening, which is mandatory for residents of some 'high risk' countries.

- 4** Some science-based courses require an Academic Technology Approval Scheme (ATAS) certificate which can take several weeks to obtain, so make sure you factor in this extra time.
- 5** Make sure you upload a copy of your visa and passport photo page (or details page) on e:vision. For more information on your obligations as a sponsored student (students requiring a Tier 4 visa) see www.york.ac.uk/tier4.

It is important that you have enough money to support you for the whole of your stay at the University. Please take the time to understand the costs of living in York, including food, accommodation, laundry, books, equipment, social activities and any travel you may have to undertake as part of any placements or research visits. Read the **Essential Financial Information** booklet available online and use the sample budget planners to help you plan your finances.


Top five things to do or know...

- 1** Visit your department's website for any subject-specific funding which might be available to you.
- 2** You will need a UK bank account. If you are an international student, research which bank you would like to use and how to open an account within the UK. Visit: www.york.ac.uk/international-students/money
- 3** Make sure you have enough cash or Travellers Cheques with you to buy food and other essential items while you open a UK bank account. It will take one or two weeks for your account to start working. NB: Some banks no longer accept Travellers Cheques.

If you are a student from the US with a query about Direct Loans please contact the Student Financial Support Unit.

- 4** Check whether the country you are leaving imposes any restrictions on the amount of money you can take out. If you are bringing more than 10,000 Euros in cash, Travellers Cheques or banker's drafts, you will be required to declare the amount on arrival at UK customs control. Cash declaration forms are available at ports and airports. Keep a copy to show the University finance staff.
- 5** If bringing family members, make sure you have budgeted for the extra cost of accommodation and childcare, which can be expensive. Check www.york.ac.uk/international-students/accom for information on accommodation costs. For more information on childcare provision, visit www.york.ac.uk/international-students/childcare.

Accommodation and things to bring

Our Accommodation Services team offers support to students looking for University or private sector accommodation. We strongly advise you to arrange your accommodation **before** arriving in York, however if you have not been able to do so, you can book hotel or guesthouse accommodation via www.visitryork.org

Top five things to do or know...

1 You can apply for any available University accommodation as soon as you have accepted an unconditional course place. International students are guaranteed accommodation if they are unconditional and have applied before 8 August 2014. All other postgraduates, couples, families or students arriving part-way through the academic year, should contact the Accommodation Office to check availability and for further help and advice. Visit www.york.ac.uk/accommodation

2 Most of our colleges accommodate both postgraduates and undergraduates. Wentworth College is our postgraduate-only college. Postgraduate rooms are self-catered and you can buy a discounted meal card (MAD). You can also buy a bedding pack before you arrive and have this delivered to your room. See store.york.ac.uk and search for bedding.

3 For private sector accommodation, visit City of York Council's website www.yorproperty.co.uk/accommodation. If you do not have someone in the UK to act as a guarantor for your rent, your landlord may ask for an advance payment of several months' rent.

4 You should see private sector property before signing a tenancy agreement so factor this into your travel arrangements. You will also need to set up accounts for gas, electricity and telephone for your property. You may need to pay council tax and buy a TV licence. For further help contact the Student Support Hub.

5 Check your college website for arrival arrangements including dates and times. If you are arriving in York early, please book a hotel or guest house to stay in until your room or property is available. See www.york.ac.uk/accommodation/visitors

Travelling to York



Make sure you know how you will travel to York when you arrive in the country, or if you are travelling from elsewhere in the UK. Airport collection is sometimes available if you are arriving at the start of the academic year in September and January. Visit: www.york.ac.uk/international-students/collection to **check availability and to book a place** in advance.

Top five things to do or know...

1 Look at the pre-arrival checklist to make sure you are fully prepared for your arrival in York. If you are coming from another country, take time to prepare emotionally and culturally for living in another country. See the 'what to bring' list on the welcome pages and www.york.ac.uk/international-students/checklist

2 If you are unable to use the airport collection, or are based in the UK, travelling to York is generally easy. Make sure you know how to get here by visiting www.york.ac.uk/international-students/travelling and www.york.ac.uk/maps.

3 If you are travelling from outside the UK please bring your passport or national identity card, unconditional offer letter, relevant qualification certificates, accommodation email (if you have one) and money in your hand luggage. These are the most important items to have with you when you enter the UK.

4 If you are intending to travel by rail, you may find purchasing a Railcard will give you a discount. If you book well in advance, or travel at a quieter time of day, you may also get cheaper tickets. Visit www.nationalrail.co.uk, or other travel sites for cheaper tickets, for example www.thetrainline.com.

5 Insure your belongings against theft or accidental damage as these are not covered by University insurance. See www.york.ac.uk/international-students/insurance.

Welcome and orientation

If you arrive at the beginning of term you will be able to take part in Welcome Week, a free programme of events and social activities. If you are an international student you will also be expected to take part in orientation activities including talks aimed at helping you acquire an understanding of UK study skills and British culture.

Top five things to do or know...

- 1** Check the welcome week activities if you are here at the start of term. If you are a new international student you need to attend orientation talks on Tuesday of week 0. If you are starting part-way through the academic year check with your department about the induction and welcome events available to you on arrival at the University. We also have a one-day January orientation event (all are welcome).
- 2** View the Graduate Student Association (GSA) welcome and events calendars for activities to help you settle in. The GSA runs trips to the supermarket and tours around the city and campus to introduce you to the local area.
- 3** Use Welcome Week and induction events to get to know other postgraduates new to York, or take the opportunity to join a society and start a new hobby.

- 4** Pick up your University card (see page 17) and look out for student membership offers and discounts with York Sport to make use of our new sports facilities.
- 5** If you are moving here with your family, get in touch with the University of York Student Family Network to meet other families new to York: www.yorkgsa.org/familynetwork.

Studying at York



There are a few basic things you can do before arrival or in your first few weeks that will help you make the most of your new studies at York.

Top five things to do or know...

1 Check for any pre-study materials provided by your department, for example reading lists, equipment checklists or information on module choices. Some departments may have a specific Preparing to Study site (sometimes on the VLE)* or information for new postgraduates on their web pages. There may also be inductions and welcome talks planned by your department.

2 Make sure you meet with your supervisor as soon as you can when you arrive at York. If you are a postgraduate researcher (PGR) you may have already had contact with your supervisor. If you are a postgraduate taught student (PGT) your department will help to place you with a relevant supervisor for your studies.

3 Visit the Library's website to find out more about the facilities, support and advice for postgraduates. Take our [virtual Library](#) tour and view our [video Library guides](#) to find out how things

work. Your department will have a dedicated Academic Liaison Librarian to advise you on how to find and use the right resources for your studies. See [Subject Guides](#) at: www.york.ac.uk/library

4 Learn about the development opportunities available to you to improve your study and research skills. Visit the Student Skills Hub for information on support for academic writing, maths, IT, languages and more. For PGR students the Researcher Development Team offer specific research and training support including Skillsforge – the University's online system for supporting students through their PhD journey.

5 Go to 'Information for... new users' on the IT Services web page for advice on how to connect to the internet on campus, or access study and IT resources off-site: www.york.ac.uk/it-services/info/newusers

Health and welfare

All students are entitled to some free healthcare provided by the National Health Service (NHS) in the UK, including certain emergency treatment, family planning services and psychiatric care. Thereafter, it may be limited.

Top five things to do or know...

- 1** Check what healthcare you are entitled to. If you are on a course of less than six months and a student from outside the EEA, free healthcare is limited so you should consider getting private health insurance before you arrive.
- 2** If you have a disability, specific learning difficulty, mental illness or medical condition, ensure the University's Disability Services are aware of any additional support you require. Tell them now so that arrangements can be made before you arrive: www.york.ac.uk/students/support/disability
- 3** Make sure you are up-to-date with your immunisations such as Meningitis, MMR and TB screening if required.
- 4** During your first week register with Unity Health (the health centre on campus), or with a local doctor's practice (also called a General Practitioner or GP). Sign up sessions

will be advertised during Welcome Week – don't wait until you feel ill.

- 5** Make sure you know what to do and who to turn to if you need support or if things go wrong. The Student Support Hub is a good place to start. You can find it in Market Square above the Nisa shop. You can also go to our web page www.york.ac.uk/students/help and there is a list of people who can help on page 15.

Top five things to do or know...

1 The Careers team offer work experiences that are valued by employers and a range of skills courses to help advance your career. Some volunteering and work experience placements require a DBS check (Disclosure and Barring Service – formerly CRB) or, for international students, a certificate of good conduct from your home police station.

2 Bookmark the Careers 'What's on' page or follow our social media for the latest information on development experiences and the opportunity to meet with employers.

3 If you are a postgraduate researcher, the Researcher Development Team (RDT) offers development and training opportunities for you at York.

4 All postgraduates are encouraged to visit the Student Skills Hub to find out how you can improve your academic and study skills or even learn a new language.

The postgraduate community at York

Whether you are joining a large or small department at York, there are plenty of opportunities to meet other postgraduates studying at York and to become an active member of our postgraduate community.

Top five things to do or know...

1 The Graduate Student Association (GSA) is dedicated to building and supporting the postgraduate community at York. You are automatically a member of the GSA and YUSU (York University Students' Union) so take a look at what they can offer you.

2 You can choose to be a member of one of our colleges. Wentworth has traditionally been the postgraduate college at York, but you can apply to any of the other eight colleges. Joining a college means you become a member of another community at the University. You will have access to common rooms and receive invitations to college activities and events. You also gain access to a further level of welfare support and student representation.

3 There are lots of different networks available to postgraduate students including the York Student Family Network (if you have brought your family with you) and the PhD Network. Most are run by the GSA. Visit their pages to find a network you would like to join.

4 The GSA organise a wide range of trips and events for postgraduates at York. Trips off campus give you the opportunity to meet new people, explore the surrounding areas and see the local attractions. Sign up to receive news about up and coming activities and events.

5 Great sports facilities at York mean you can participate in the sports you love and try out new ones at whatever level you want. You may wish to join one of the University teams or societies offering competitive or social sporting activities. The GSA also fully funds a number of free sports sessions for postgraduates – so there is no excuse not to get involved.

College team	This includes your college Provost or Principal, dean or officer, residential tutors, administrator and Graduate Common Room Committee (GCRC) reps. They can help you with any college accommodation or welfare issues. You will meet them all at the beginning of term.
Porters	Porters act as a point of contact on local receptions and can help with general issues including lost keys, maintenance problems and general security. They can also get help for any accidents, incidents or emergencies.
Student Support Hub	This is your first point of contact for specialist support services, dealing with a range of issues including immigration advice and international support, finance and money advice, emotional wellbeing, disability, housing and more. It is based in Market Square above Nisa and Your Shop. The Hub is open 9am–5pm on Monday to Friday during term time and 10am–4pm during vacation periods.
