
Explore our great, historic city

Complementing the study options are our carefully selected **academic** and **intercultural skills** sessions, as well as a taster of the **York Strengths employability skills** programme. These are designed to introduce you to some of the **key skills** that will support you through university – and beyond. SUBJECT SPECIFIC ACADEMIC OPTIONS

Developing Solutions to Session 1 Environmental Challenges

Department of Environment and Geography

There's never been a more important time to study environmental issues. Climate change is having major impacts on agriculture and wildlife. Air pollution is affecting human health and reducing life expectancy. Plastic waste is clogging our waterways and disrupting ocean ecosystems.

On this short course, you will learn about pressing environmental issues and the ways in which we are trying to solve them through research, education, policies and innovations. You will participate in discussions about the best ways to solve environmental problems, and what we need to do now to protect and repair our planet.

Exploring the World with Psychology

Session 1

Department of Psychology

Psychology can be found within all aspects of daily life and society. Join us to explore just a small part of what psychology can tell us about the worlds of technology, health and wellbeing, neurodiversity and prejudice.

On this short course, you will learn how technology has changed the way we interact with one another and how psychology can help us to understand these new interactions. You will take a look at the psychology that explains why people have negative attitudes towards others and what we can try to do about this. You will investigate the impact that our gender, childhood, personalities and stress levels can have on our health and wellbeing. You will also discover what it really means to live and grow up being neurodiverse, trying to navigate the world with, for example, dyslexia or ADHD, and why listening to lived experiences can help improve research and our understanding.

Exploring the Universe Session 1 and Engineering the Future

School of Physics, Engineering and Technology

From the most fundamental building blocks of the universe to cutting edge technologies, physics and engineering help us to both understand the world around us and make positive changes to our environment.

On this short course, you will explore the full scale of the cosmos, from the smallest particles to stars and galaxies. You will learn about cutting edge research that may offer solutions to some of humanity's most pressing issues, from climate change to healthcare. You will discover how new technologies are changing our everyday lives, from immersive audiovisual experiences to space robotics. You will also have the opportunity to put your learning into action with hands-on lab experiments and engineering challenges, giving you an insight into what studying physics and engineering at university is like.

Literature on Location: Session 2 Exploring Literary Yorkshire

Department of English and Related Literature

Yorkshire has an extraordinary literary history that stretches from the medieval period and even before up to the present day. How has Yorkshire's glorious landscape influenced some of the most important works of English literature? And what does it mean to think about novels, poems, drama and more in the place they were imagined and created?

On this short course, you will learn about literature written in and about Yorkshire, taking in the novels and poems of the Brontë sisters, Wilkie Collins' groundbreaking detective novel, The Moonstone, Lawrence Sterne's weird and wonderful literary experiments and contemporary writing from Kate Atkinson and A. S. Byatt, among others.

Feeding the Future



Department of Biology Department of Chemistry

As the global population grows, we face a range of challenges, including an increasing demand for food and other resources. Scientists are working to develop solutions to the problems that threaten our food supply, such as unsustainable farming practices and a changing climate. We need more nutritious and resilient crops, alongside circular processes where food waste is used to make valuable products to reduce the demand for non-renewable resources.

On this short course, you will learn about recent research that aims to better understand and tackle these challenges. You will hear from the people carrying out this important research and gain hands-on experience of laboratory work. As part of a small team, you will also have the opportunity to develop possible solutions to these global challenges

Business and Society: Session 2 Developing a Social Enterprise

Centre for Global Programmes

Communities, now more than ever, need support to thrive. The need for 'social good' initiatives is greater than ever in the turbulent world we live in, with climate catastrophe on the horizon, widening pay gaps between the rich and poor, and a growing digital divide.

On this short course, you will learn how to develop your ideas for a better world into something tangible such as a social enterprise, community interest company or co-operative. You will learn about how to market the initiative, get funding, reach your audience and make an impact on your communities, and will have the opportunity to develop plans for your own social enterprise.

Eligibility

This programme is open to all students aged 16 to 18 in secondary or further education who are planning to enter higher education and are ready to get a taste of what it means to study at a top university in the UK.

Applicants must have had their 16th birthday before starting to study on our programme.

We welcome students from all nationalities and backgrounds. We accept a limited number of participants from each nationality to make sure we have a diverse international student body.

Academic requirements

Our summer school is designed for students with a keen academic interest. While we do not have formal academic requirements and will not ask for a school transcript, you'll be asked to demonstrate your interest at an informal interview with our staff.

English requirements

The programme is suitable for both native speakers of English and for students who have been learning English as a second/foreign language.

Although there is no formal language requirement, we strongly recommend that applicants have a good upper-intermediate level of English (ca. CEFR B2 or IELTS 5).

Accommodation and catering

You will be staying in a single room in one of 11 colleges situated on our wonderful parkland campus. Your fellow students will be staying in the same accommodation block, but you'll be able to have privacy in your own room. University of York students working as house parents will also be available any time you need help. Rooms have shared bathrooms (the average room:bathroom ratio is 5:1). Your room will have a sink.

You'll have three meals a day on our campus, and we provide a packed lunch for excursions.

Welfare and security

Students' safety is our utmost priority. Therefore, we provide 24/7 supervision on our pre-university programme.

We also operate an emergency phone line to support students who need help during their stay with us.

Our Safeguarding and Welfare Procedures are available online.

Insurance

As part of our programme package we provide free student travel insurance including additional Covid-19 cover. Full insurance terms and conditions are available on our website.

Programme fees

The programme fee per two-week session is £3,407.

It is inclusive of the academic and free time programme, accommodation, three meals per day and travel insurance.

Transfer options

We offer a convenient airport transfer service that will take you from any airport in the UK directly to the University. Your taxi driver will meet you at the arrivals hall of the airport, so you don't need to worry about finding your way.

Alternatively, you can arrange your own transport to York.
