


Patrick Gwynn-Jones has a flair for clubs: he's the food and wine master of both the Tabasco Club and the Australian Beefsteak and Burgundy Club. Opening a restaurant was a surprising move for him after spending the Fifties and Sixties as a fashion and music photographer; but the past 30 years have been a great success for his quirky venue, which attracts politicians, wine lovers and writers. Many a plot is hatched and many a heart broken in the drawing room's dark corners. The eclectic menu is nicely consistent: gravadlax, carpet-bag steak, Persian duck with pomegranates, seared tuna with ginger salsa, curried goat with fried plantain and beef Wellington.

Harpers & Queen

Pomegranates is the sort of quirky, welcoming, cosy, club-like place that, once you discover it, makes you feel like you're one of London's insiders. The seventies decor is original, not retro, and features antique mirrors and paintings. But the focus is on the food. What's cooking? Pomegranates has a very reasonable claim to the best steak tartare in London from Aberdeen Angus beef, but the cosmopolitan menu also features West Indian curried goat, and Cantonese roast duck.
